tion in office; but, your Excellency, I decline to be your unscrupulous tool, and however great the cost, I am thankful that my manhood repelled the temptation—even in my present unfortunate condition.

"There is no one who knows me, your Excellency, will doubt my personal courage among my own people, not one of my enemies will believe that I was ever afraid to vindicate my personal honor with any man; so a suggestion of cowardice will not help you.

"In conclusion I desire to say that in these charges I have used no names of third parties, because I do not desire to injure those who are my friends, while, at the same time, they have acted as messengers for you; but if you deny that you suggested the outrageous alternative published in this letter, I assure you that I have full and ample proof to substantiate my statement." (Signed.) "ROBERT HANCOCK."

This letter has caused great indignation here against the Governor, and quite a revolution of feeling in Hancock's favor.

There can be no doubt as to the truth of the charges Mr. Hancock makes against the Governor. He has it, he says, in black and white. The Journal to-morrow morning will say editorially:

"In all the annals of political debauchery in this or any other State, nothing approaches the demand of Governor Russell, as accused by Robert Hancock. If such a course were pursued to secure revenge by the lowest criminal, it would be shocking, but for the chief executive of a sovereign State to descend to such revolting depths, if the accusation is proven true, passes human conception. That North Carolina is to be under the rule of such a man as Russell, who would keep men in office only upon their becoming thugs to maim or even kill at his behest, is enough to cause social disorder and chaos, and nothing remains for the people of North Carolina except to take immediate action to discover the truth or falsity of Hancock's terrible accusation."

The best opinion is that it settles beyond all question the impeachment of Russell by the next Legislature.

It took five pulls of the bell by a News and Observer reporter to awaken him from these blissful dreams, and when he came down into the hall in response to a request given through Mr. Alexander, the private secretary, the Governor was naturally a little out of humor, but when apprised of the object of the reporter's visit his countenance changed and he became in a moment all attentive. He listened ill-concealed pajamas to the reading of Hancock's charges. When the reading was over, he was stoically quiet for a moment, then he said: "You can say for me that I never said anything to Hancock about assaulting Daniels or anybody else. He studied a few minutes, and added, 'Tell Robert Hancock that he is a liar.'"

The Governor's attention was then called to Hancock's declaration that he could prove his assertion, when he replied, "I have never made such a proposition to anybody, and I don't care who says I did."

It was then suggested that suppose Hancock brings out the names of those by whom he proposes to prove the assertion? "He hasn't got any names. I don't know of any he can give and what's more, I don't care."

Referring to the position of the North Carolina Journal in regard to this matter, the Governor requested that his compliments be sent to Editor Stevens in the following language: "You may say for me that that fellow Stevens is a carpet-bag scoundrel."

With this, the Governor being in a better humor with the reporter than when he was first awakened by him, thanked the reporter for calling his attention to the matter, and as he went up stairs said, "I suppose that's enough to say."
