

BANK CASHIER A SUICIDE

Mr. Miller Attended to Duties About His Home and Then Shot Himself in Head.

New Bern, July 12.—Standing in front of a mirror in his bedroom, J. Will Miller, cashier of the Bank of Oriental, at Oriental, this morning fired a bullet from a .32 calibre revolver into his head. The bullet tore a gaping hole in the head and caused almost instant death.

Young, in the best of health and respected by every one who knew him, Mr. Miller was presumably a man to be envied. A devoted wife and two children seemed to have made his cup of happiness complete and his rash act is hard to comprehend.

According to what information could be secured in regard to the suicide, Mr. Miller arose early this morning, went out to the stable in the rear of his home and milked the cow, after which he spent some time in mowing the lawn. Completing this he went to his room, where he found his wife and children. He told them to go down stairs and that he would follow them within a few minutes.

Little thinking that she would never see her husband alive again, Mrs. Miller obeyed his instructions. A few minutes later she heard the report of a revolver and a sound as if somebody had struck the floor. Quickly she rushed back upstairs and into the room she had quitted but a few minutes before and there she saw Mr. Miller's lifeless body lying on the floor.

That the suicide was premeditated is the general belief. Mr. Miller never kept a revolver in the house until the latter part of last week, when he carried one from the bank and it is believed that at that time he had made up his mind to end his life.

Presumably there is no cause for the suicide. The affairs of the bank were looked into last March and were found to be in tip-top shape and Mr. Miller was complimented upon the way that he was handling the business.

State Bank Examiner Hubbard has been notified of the affair and requested to come to Oriental as quickly as possible and make an examination and nothing definite will be known until this has been done. He is expected to reach Oriental Tuesday.

MR. H. P. DORTCH DEAD

END CAME CALMLY AT 10:30 THIS MORNING.

Yesterday afternoon the Argus carried a notice that Mr. Harrod P. Dortch was yesterday morning stricken with paralysis at an early hour. Today it is our sad duty to announce his death, which occurred at 10:30 o'clock this morning, at the home of Dr. and Mrs. C. W. Grainger, near by, where his daughter, Mrs. Grainger, had him removed yesterday morning for her more convenient care of him, and where every skill of physician and nursing was given him, but without avail. The summons had come to him—and which he had been expecting—and he calmly "fell on sleep", in the 69th year of his age.

Mr. Dortch was the oldest son of the late Hon. W. T. Dortch, and was one of our best known and most cordially esteemed citizens. He was a native of Goldsboro and almost as old as the town itself, and his entire life was spent in our midst. He was one of the most courteous, agreeable and considerate of men, a typical gentleman of the old Southern school, and numbered his friends by the wide circle of his acquaintances. He was a life time member of St. Stephen's Episcopal church. For a number of years Mr. Dortch has been associated with the Norfolk Southern Railroad, in the freight department, and both by the railroad officials and the public with whom he did business he was held in highest esteem, and his death will be a source of personal sorrow wherever he was known.

Mr. Dortch married in early manhood Miss Ellen Sasser, and his long married life was most happy, his beloved wife preceding him to the tomb seven years ago, and surviving them are five children, Mrs. Chas. W. Grainger, Mr. John S. and H. P. Dortch, Jr., of this city, Mrs. James S. Lewis, of Rocky Mount, and Mr. Phil Dortch of California. Three sisters and two brothers, also, survive him, Miss Corinne Dortch and Col. W. T. Dortch, of this city, Mrs. Mary Dortch Schofield, only recently moved to Jacksonville Fla., Mrs. Annie Dortch Hill, of California, and Fitzhugh Lee Dortch, of Seattle, Wash. Three grand children and a wide circle of near relatives. To his sorrowing children, brothers and sisters, the tender and solicitous sympathy of all Goldsboro goes out in fullest measure.

The funeral, conducted by Rev. R. B. Owens, rector of the Episcopal church of Rocky Mount, will be held from the home of Dr. and Mrs. Grainger tomorrow afternoon at 5 o'clock, and the interment will be made in the family plot, beside his late wife, in Willow Dale cemetery.
