It's a smart idea and I hope the Brody's make a lot of money from bringing this much-needed facility to Kinston's downtown shopping area.

Several year's familiarity with the plumbing in Europe has caused me time after time since my return to this country to wonder at the stupidity of municipal design that permits the creation of a town the size of Kinston with absolutely no decent public toilets and lavatories. We have hundreds of "human filling stations", ranging from Coke boxes up to the big cafes all over town but we have never given equal consideration to the fact that people who fill up most inevitably empty themselves.

Folks say it's not a nice subject—but that's the trouble, everybody's left the idea strictly alone because of the absurd notion that there is something vul-

gar or immoral about performing acts that everyone has to perform regularly—well a few are irregular. There are toilets in the courthouse, but at the very time they are most needed, Saturday afternoon, the joint is locked up. Also very few people have ever learned that the court house does have clean and ample restrooms. I make an unofficial motion here that the commissioners make some arrangements for keeping these restrooms open on Saturday.

In this same vein, it has often occurred to me that we would have a far more effective force for the good of the merchants and the customers if we had a centrally located downtown office for the Merchant's Association. Such a location could include a parcel checking and wrapping service, information to shoppers who are not familiar with the business locations of Kinston
