It is located between Kinston and Hugo, just on the Kinston side of Stonyton Creek. Today it is owned by Mr.

Light in The Act

Deputy Sheriff Brown Yates of Pollocksville and Patrolman Marving Thomas last Thursday night "freed" a pair of uninvited visitors who were making a midnight visit to the Henderson Brothers' Garage in Maysville. Both of these visitors were nabbed and on Monday morning after a hearing before Magistrate J. H. Dixon, they were bound over to the next term of Superior Court in Jones County under \$150 bond. It is impossible to determine exactly when the home was built but its architectural style, the materials from which it is built and the best memories of those who know something of its history place its age at just over 100 years. It is known that it was standing at the time of the War Between The States, since the late Mrs. Amelia Hardee Pridgen, mother of Mrs. J. Garves Poole of Kinston and Mrs. Henry W. Cutchin of Rocky Mount, was born there during the war.

Records in the Lenoir County courthouse indicate that Calvin Tucker was perhaps the builder of the home since he owned the plantation until September 18, 1860, when it was sold to Lemuel Bright Hardee, a grandson of Simon Bright, one of the founders of Kinston.

Lemuel Bright Hardee died without leaving a will and a jury of six men under the chairmanship

of the place from his mother-in-law because of two reasons that might be termed "sentimental". It was the birthplace of his wife. The second "sentimental reason" for Pridgen wanting the handsome old home was the fact that Calvin Tucker was his grandfather.

On September 1, 1904, Pridgen and his wife sold the place to the late William H. Heath and at the death of Heath it passed to its present owner.

In searching the records connected with this property one comes upon a name for the swamp that flanks the homesite on the northeast. Peculiarly enough that name has been lost to this generation and it is doubtful that anyone in the county today realizes that this swamp was originally named "Losing Swamp".

Sheriff Sam Churchill today proudly remembers this fine old home since he was born there during the period when his father, the late Richard Churchill, managed
