The Army Corps of Engineers at the request of Congressman Graham Barden, who was petitioned in 1949 by more than 200 Jones County landowners, has completed a survey of the river from Trenton to the Jones-Le-noir County line and reports that the stream can be cleared of obstruction over this distance for \$75,000.

The Corps of Engineers has recommended that \$50,000 of this be included in the 1951-52 budget but it will be necessary for the other \$25,000 to be raised in Jones County, Soil Conservation-ist D. M. Griffin points out.
