Wallace, Trustee, dated the 12th day of December, 1946, and recorded in Book 105, page 384, in the office of the Register of Deeds of Jones County; and under and by virtue of the authority vested in the undersigned as Substituted Trustee by an instrument of writing dated the 18th day of March, 1953, and recorded in Book 116, page 330, in the office of the Register of Deeds of Jones County, default having been made on the payment of the indebtedness thereby secured and the said deed of trust being by the terms thereof subject to foreclosure, and the holder of the indebtedness thereby secured having demanded a foreclosure thereof for the purpose of satisfying said indebtedness, the undersigned substituted trustee will offer for sale at public auction to the highest bidder for cash at the courthouse door in Trenton, North Carolina, at 12:00 o'clock noon on the 21st day of April, 1953, THE ONE-FOURTH UNDIVIDED INTEREST in the lands as conveyed in said deed of trust, the same lying and being in Pollockville Township, Jones County, North Carolina, and more particularly bounded and described as follows:

On the North by Trent River, on the East by Reedy Branch, and on the South by Lot No. 1, of the division of the Trentwood Farm, and more particularly bounded and described as follows:

BEGINNING at an iron stake on Reedy Branch, the Northeast corner of Lot No. 1, and running the reversed line of Lot No. 1, South 83-00 West, 27.72 chains to an iron stake standing 13 feet West from the center of the public road, and 2 feet North from an Oak tree pointer; thence with another line of Lot No. 1 reversed, North 88-45 West 38-30

Question: "What are the best steps to take in controlling termites?"

Answer: The species of termite that causes the most damage in North Carolina is the subterranean termite. This "nesting type" insect thrives on wood. But it cannot live without moisture. Being a subterranean insect, it lives in the soil, according to George D. Jones, in charge of extension entomology.

The number one step to take in combating termites is to make sure no wooden parts of buildings reach the ground unless they are thoroughly treated. This means that no wooden scraps should be used to fill in areas around the foundation. Stumps and wood scraps should not be left under the building. Wooden supports and foundation walls should rest upon a concrete footing and not be permitted to extend through the concrete to the gravel below. Openings in the foundation wall will help remove the moisture under the building, without which the termites will move on

to a more desirable location.

The use of a foundation shield to cover foundation walls and piers is good, but be sure to seal each joint of the shield.

Chemicals should be used when termites begin attacking foundation timbers or flooring. Removal of "soil tracks" (small tunnels constructed by termites as passages from the soil to the wood) and ventilation will usually help a great deal. But it will also help to treat the soil. Good outside drainage is also helpful. To apply chemicals, dig a narrow trench next to the foundation under the building. Use about one gallon of 5 per cent DDT and oil, a 5 per cent pentachlorophenol-oil mixture or a creosote-oil product to saturate each three or five linear feet of the trench.
