

Otherwise, shallow rooting encouraged. One inch of w ter applied over a period of several hours will usually be sufficient to soak the ground to the proper depth. Water should never be applied at a rate faster than the ground can

soak it up. To apply the equivalent of one inch of water to a halfacre garden plot in 24 hours of pumping requires a pump with a capacity of about 550 gallons an hour.

Permanent pastures should be top-dressed once each year with 400 to 600 pounds per acre of 0-10-20, 0-9-27, or 0-14-14.

"An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure," when it comes to protecting wheat from insects, birds, and rodents.

The first step in protecting wheat is to get rid of sources of infestation, and that this action should be taken now, before the crop is harvested.

Even a few grains of wheat left over from last year can harbor enough weevils to start a serious infestation. It is important to destroy these weevils before this year's crop is stored because once they gain a foothold in new grain, their num-bers will multiply rapidly and they are very difficult to stamp out
