BASEBALL AND TV

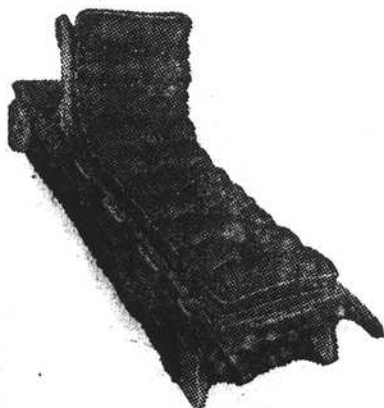
Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick told U. S. Senators telecasting and broadcasting major league baseball games are ruining the minors and will inevitably damage the majors. . . . Frick figures: 18 million less fans attended minor league games in 1952 than in 1949; only 19 of 273 minor-league teams made money in 1952. . . . The commissioner wants organized baseball to have the power it used to have before the Department of Justice threatened baseball with antitrust suits. . . . Meanwhile figures compiled so far this season show a 24 per cent drop in attendance as compared with the same period of 1952. . . . All this points to the fact that baseball may be a sick game and in a few more years may not be America's major sport. It takes big money to run a baseball club, and the money comes from the fans.
