The rage between Lenoir County's seat in the General Asmbly was one of the hottest and most bitter in this area. Incumbent Tom White beat his second-time opponent Harvey Turner but by less margin than two years ago. This year his margin was 709 votes it was nearly 1,000 two years, ago.

White, who voted for the socalled secrey law in the 1953 General Assembly stood up and fought the newspapers to a standstill in that race, which perhaps gained is myotes.
