This is W. Brown Yates, Democratic nominee for Sheriff of Jones County who not only ran high in a seven-way race for the post but also secured a clear majority over the entire field, polling 279 more votes than the other six candidates combined. Yates had served for the past four years as chief deputy under the late Sheriff Jeter Taylor who died earlier this spring. The highlights of the Saturday voting in Jones County was the overwhelming licking that political novice "Brown" Yates gave to six others who were seeking the job of Jones County Sheriff.

Yates not only ran high by a wide margin, but in one swoop secured a clear majority over the entire opposing sextet, with 1329 votes which amounted to 279 more votes than all of the other six men got put together.

Running a very weak second was Allen Creagh with 358, County Commissioner Paul Westbrook limped in a weak third with 258, Gilbert Scott trailed in fourth place with 187 votes, Frank Brock ran fifth with 130 votes, Preston Collins was a weak sixth with 106 votes and Guy Rouse almost failed to get in the race with only 11 votes in the eight precincts.

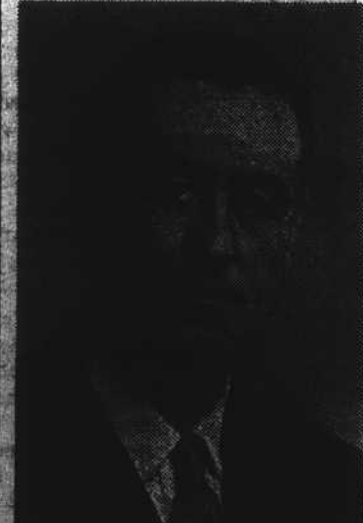

Blackledge Harper On USS Fulton

Blackledge E. Harper, torpedoman's mate second class, USN, of Deep Run, N. C., and husband of the former Miss Lois L. O'Neill, of Hartford, Conn., took part in Armed Forces Day ceremonies here May 15th while serving aboard the submarine tender USS Fulton.

The race between Lenoir County's seat in the General Assembly was one of the hottest and most bitter in this area. Incumbent Tom White beat his second-time opponent Harvey Turner but by less margin than two years ago. This year his margin was 709 votes it was nearly 1,000 two years ago.

White, who voted for the so-called secrecy law in the 1953 General Assembly stood up and fought the newspapers to a standstill in that race, which perhaps gained him votes.

On two other scores the laughable deer horns and eel worm bills, White "win and bore it" but he didn't like it. In the final analysis these bills perhaps reduced White's margin of victory more than the more important issues at stake.

Both White and Turner took positive stands in opposition to ending segregation in our public schools. So there was little to choose from on that score, except that Turner in a candidates' forum spoke at length on "strengthening our school attendance laws," which was not too politic a thing to say in the face of the recent supreme court decision.

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
