

Chadwick Gets 25-30 Years for Killing Pregnant Wife

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Jones Farm Bureau Membership Drive Starting Monday With Aim Toward 700 Members in County

The Farm Bureau leader emphasized the need for getting the organization's enrollment program completed in one week this year, because of the policy development and policy extension meetings which must be held before the State Farm Bureau Convention in November.

Koonce said that this year's county Farm Bureau Membership quota of 700 would go to make up a state quota of 70,000.

He pointed out that if all counties came through with their Farm Bureau membership quotas this year, North Carolina will lead the South.

Judge Joseph W. Parker of Windsor, who succeeded Supreme Court Judge Hunt Parker as presiding judge of the Third Judicial District, convened a one-week mixed term of Jones County's Superior Court Monday morning and along with Solicitor W. J. Bundy waded into the 112-case criminal docket. Brief pauses between criminal actions were taken up with hearing of the 18 civil causes before the court, most of these being uncontested divorces.

By noon-time Tuesday seven couples had been divorced and 14 criminal defendants heard their cases concluded.

Divorces, all on grounds of two years separation, went to Christine R. Boone from Odell Boone, Etta Sanderson Booth from John R. Booth, A. W. Edwards from Minnie Lee Edwards, Thomas Earl Rouse from Irene Eubanks Rouse, Emma Benner Flowers from Herbert Flowers, Alberta Hill Bryant from Marrell Bryant and Alfonza Meadows from Helena White Meadows.

Criminal cases cleared from the docket by noon Tuesday included:

James Mattocks, reckless driving and driving without a license, six months suspended on payment of \$75 fine and the court costs.

Christian Bryant, assault on a female and non-support, 12 months on the road suspended upon the condition he pay \$30 to his wife and children.

Ray Holt was found not guilty of liquor law violation.

Frank H. Morton drew a six month road term suspended on payment of \$100 fine and court costs for drunken driving.

An assault with a deadly weapon charge was not pressed against John Allen Turnage when the prosecuting witness failed to show up.

Four men charged with breaking in the Trenton Oil Company and getting \$195 were sentenced as follows: James Aboda Whitfield and Clarence Alfred Gooding each were given three to five years. Emmanuel Whitfield has a 12 month sentence suspended upon condition of three year probation and Dalton Dewey Brock drew a three to five year sentence suspended on condition he pay the oil company \$195 by December court term and remain on probation for five years.

Bennie Lee Eubanks drew six months on the road suspended on payment of a \$100 fine and court costs after he pled guilty to drunken driving.

Health Officer Suggests Tetanus Shot for Athletes Using Grainger Stadium After Jaycee Horse Show

The letter which follows here has aroused considerable interest and anxiety among patrons of Grainger High School and resulted from the Grainger Stadium Committee authorizing a Jaycee-sponsored horse show in the stadium October 16th and 17th.

Dear Mr. Mock:

After full consultation with the State Health Department and the chairman of the Lenoir County Board of Health, it is

recommended that all persons who will participate in athletics at the Grainger Stadium this school year be actively immunized against Tetanus.

Those participating in football should commence immunization immediately with the other participants commencing their immunizations shortly.

It is also suggested that the coaches of visiting teams be notified that it is recommended that men also be afforded this protection.

This letter is being written in the light of a coming event that is now schedule to take place on the Grainger Stadium

Athletic Field.

I will discuss with you, at your earliest convenience, the methods of giving these immunizations.

At the time permission was granted for the show Alderman John Rider, a member of the stadium committee, raised the tetanus question and Dr. Fleming Fuller pointed out that tetanus germs cannot survive in air, and tetanus can only flourish in a deep, puncture-type wound where the germ may multiply free of oxygen. Fuller pointed out that since he was a horse lover, and his daughter has a horse which she plans to show in the Kinston event he had not trusted his own opinion and had asked four disinterested doctors on the staff of Memorial General Hospital, and each of these had agreed with him that the dangers involved to athletes because of the horse show being held in the stadium were extremely remote.

It was pointed out that Greenville, Farmville, Weldon, Enfield, Mount Olive, Clinton and possibly many other towns in Eastern Carolina had for many years been holding horse shows in their ball park and each had again this year.

There was strong opposition to the horse show from Mayor Guy Elliott, who is also a member of the county board of health, from City Manager Bill Heard and Coach Mock. Heard largely objected to "letting down the bars to any kind of future use of the park." Mock and Elliott made no public statements as to their specific reasons for objecting. Elliott as chairman of the Stadium committee voted against the horse show but made no statement.

Car That Killed 13th Lenoir Hiway Victim



It is not difficult to understand how 24-year old J. B. Bullock of Ayden was killed in this badly mangled car. But it is difficult to understand how any other person in the car escaped death. Bullock was killed instantly when his head was pierced by a pipe in a junk yard near Louis Kilpatrick's filling station Saturday night when the car, apparently travelling at a high rate of speed went out of control on the curve at

the spot and landed in the junk yard. Investigating Patrolman H. H. Stokes has indicted Tip C. Adams Jr., driver of the car for involuntary manslaughter and the Greenville man is held under \$2,500 bond pending trial of his case. Bullock was the 13th traffic fatality of 1954 in Lenoir County.
