Unpaved Jones-Lenoir Roads Given Priority Ratings Monday

Division Highway Engineer Maynard Hicks of Snow Hill Monday presented the Lenoir and Jones County Boards of commissioners with "Priority Maps" which had each unpaved road in the two counties given a rating for future paving. Some 205 priority ratings were given out in Lenoir County and 62 such roads were on the Jones County map. The Jones County listing of 62 projects totals 106.45 miles of roadway. The Lenoir County mileage for these future paving allocations was 194.13 miles.

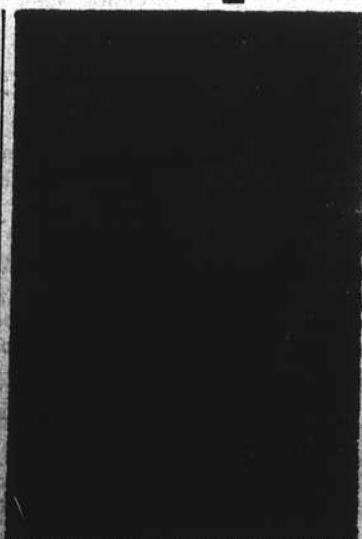
Bud Tilghman of the Caswell Section near Kinston was under \$100 bond charged with having 11 jars of stumpole whiskey in his possession.
