A five-month report compiled by Kinston Utilities Suprintendent Graham McAdams reveals two things, one pleasant and the other not so nice to recall. First, that the income of the city-owned electricity and water plants is running considerably ahead of budgeted expectations and, secondly, that Hurricane Hazel's cost to the utilities department was \$17,109.14, which figure cannot, of course, contain the revenues lost for that period of from several hours to several days when power was not flowing to many of the city's custo-
