

A brief lock this week at the teachers' pay situation in Jones County reveals a wide spread be-ween the top and low salaries ing paid

Because of interest at the state level in pay raises for teachers many people are concerned with exactly what teachers are being paid at present.

Jonés County this year has 105 teachers in all its schools and their total pay is \$327,059 for the year. The lowest salary being paid to any teacher in the system this year is \$200 per month for a ninemonth period, hence an annual salary of \$1,800. This goes to a teacher with an "Elementary A" certificate which means that particular teacher has had only one year of college training.

The top salary paid for the ninemonth category is \$3,807, or \$428 per month for each of the ninemonths.

Vocational Agriculture 'Teachers who pay comes partly from federal as well as state sources are paid for 12 months in the year and the top rate in Jones County in that category presently is, \$5,040 per year, or \$420 per month.


