The specialist warns against us-ing furniture polishes, oils or var-nishes on leather because these parations frequently contain ents that cause leather to beme sticky.

If leather appears to be drying out, rub it with a small amount of a leather dressing with the fingers and paim of the hand. In humid weather leather mildews easily. Keep leather as clean as pos-able and in a dry place. Wipe mildew off (with a damp cloth) promptly, then dry with an electric fan. Leather shoes, handbags and book-bindings as well as leather upholstery need to be kept in a dry place in summer to prevent mil-
