She was thrown through the windshield of the truck and suffered two fractures of the left leg and multiple serious cuts about the face and throat. Attending Physician Payne Dale says on Wednesday that her condition is fair. She is an expectant mother.

This is the interior of the front seat of the Hill car, showing the badly mangled steering wheel which crushed the life out of Hill and the shattered! windshield which inflicted the injury believed tohave caused the death of Turnage.

Hill was driving in the wrong lane of traffic, apparently without lights at the time of the crash in front of Dr. C. B. Randall's Riverbank Animal. Hospital.
