## Bowman Gray, Speaker for Annual Stabilization Meeting

L. T. Weeks, General Manager, Flue Cured Tobacco Cooperative Stabilization Corporation, annunced today that Bowman Gray, a. m. President of R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Company, will be the principal speaker at Stabilization's 12th

Annual Stockholders Meeting on June 27th. The meeting will be held in Raleigh, N. C., at the Sir Walter Hotel, beginning at 10:00

Other highlights of the meeting will be the annual reports of the President, Carl T. Hicks, Walstonburg, N. C., and General Manager

During the business session, three directors will be elected for 3-year terms. Members of the Board whose terms expire this year are George L. Pate, Rowland, George Sockwell, Elon College, and J. E. Winslow, Greenville, who died on April 8, 1958.

Other business to come before the stockholders will be a proposed amendment to the By-Laws to provide for a tenth director and for the setting up of ten districts for the district elections of directors after 1958. At present, all directors are elected at the Annual Meeting by the stockholders in attendance.

Upon adoption of the proposed amendment, the tenth director would be elected for a one-year term at the annual meeting this year and thereafter his successor would be elected for a term of three years. Also, upon adoption of this amendment, the Board of Directors, as soon as practicable after the Annual Meeting this year, shall divide the entire flue-cured territory into ten districts and pro-vide that thereafter, each vacancy on the Board shall be filled by election in the proper district.

### Better Service; Insurance Commissioner To Visit 21st In their most recent meeting the

members of the Trenton Volunteer Fire Department discussed ways and means of developing better service for the area they serve.

The most difficult problem, which has not yet been completely solved is a 24-hour, 365-day-tothe-year telephone that may be called by people who are in urgent need of fire fighters and their equipment.

Posters have been ordered giving instructions to Trenton area residents on what to do in case of fire and these will be posted in prominent locations.

One suggestion offered by a former volunteer fireman (Journal Editor Jack Rider) that is being explored with the telephone company is a telephone located either at the fire station or in the main part of town with an outside bell that would ring loudly enough to alert people in the area.

At present a person needing the fire department may have to make several calls before finding a person to report the fire to.

At the next meeting of the department on July 21st a fish stew supper is to be served and State Insurance Commissioner Charlie Gold will be the honored guest and principal speaker. He will outline the policies and minimum equipment necessities before a fire department begins to have any happy bearing on local insurance rates.

# Senator Ervin Reports:

WASHINGTON - The Senate passed the Kennedy-Ives labor bill last week, after five days of extensive debate. In most part the bill was confined to the elimination of abuses in the labor-management field which were uncovered by the McClellan Committee.

#### WISE COURSE

The Senate was wise in so limiting the bill. To have attempted broadside revisions of the Taft-Hartley law through amendments would have spelled the defeat of any labor legislation at this time. This was true because of the deep divisions in the Senate regarding Taft-Hartley changes which would have delayed action and would have brought about a bill unable to win majority support. By refusing this course the Senate was able to get a bill which effectively implants union democracy and weeds out corrupt influences in the labormanagement field: Now the Senate can proceed to give separate attention to other needed reforms boyesit and organizational picket-

#### PROVISIONS

The long list of provisions contained in the Kennedy-Ives bill cannot be detailed in this column. Reference to a few, however, will show its strength. Briefly stated bargaining rights under Taft-Hartare some of the things this bill ley.

Requires under criminal penalties full reporting by employers and labor relations consultants of workers in the exercise of their for this 12th Annual Meeting".

Provides criminal penalties for givers and receivers of bribes in labor management dealings.
