This is particularly true due to the sacred protection of first class mail. Postal employees are not allowed to disturb such mail even though they may know that it contains obscene matter.

This matter of obscenity takes many forms. It is particularly directed toward the youth of the land. It has grown to be a business.

land. It has grown to be a business estimated to amount to five hundred million dollars annually.

Since our hope for our tomorrows rests primarily in our youth of to-day we should do everything pos-sible to see that youth is given an opportunity to develop the highest spiritual values. Obscene matter directs the energies of youth towards a different kind of training.

Since first class mail has the privilege of privacy the only way the postal service can act effectively to control it is through the cooperation of those who happen to receive this type of literature. Should you or your family receive such matter through the mails it will be most helpful if you will report it to the postal authorities. In dealing with this problem it is indeed later than we think.
