Mengel said the stream sanitation committee could be asked to review its determination of the need for such a system in the Kinston area, and he said the decisions of the committee were also subject to review in the courts.

The Kinston aldermen seemed unanimous in the view that the city should postpone committments as long as possible while seeking relief from the present law in the General Assembly.

Members of the board expressed the view that research now underway may turn up better and more economical systems and that the present session of congress may materially liberalize federal grants for such work.

Mengel said on this \$2.3 million project the city could, at present, expect the maximum federal grant of \$250,000 plus considerable help Caswell Training Frosty Morn Packing Company, the Pepsi-Cola bottling works and the Coca-Cola bottling works, whose sewage would be collected into the system if they so desired, and there were indications that all did wish to co-operate in this project when and if it is built.

Mengel said four men would be required to operate the plant he recommends. The lagoon site recommendations are near the Simon Jackson airport, near the junction of NC 58 and Southwest Creek, just east of Tower Hill Road in the vicinity of the Rachel Tull farm and another site just back of the Dickerson farm.

The alternate sites recommended for the conventional system-which is the plant Mengel says is best for Kinston-are just across Neuse River and just east of the Southern Railways line, and at the same site as the lagoon site back of the Rachel Tull farm.

Telephone Company construction forces have begun work on a project which provides placing cable facilities along Highway 58, and on a road adjacent to Highway 58 West of Trenton, North Carolina, to serve some eight applicants.

This was disclosed today by C. A. Benson, local manager at New Bern, who stated the project involves placing approximately 5.2 miles of buried cable at an estimated expenditure of \$7,536.

This is one of many such rural projects being undertaken by the Telephone Company to provide service to its 41-county operating territory.


Mixed Up Marine
