## Liquor Sales Continue Climb in Jones Stores

Sales reports for February and Celebrity in Maysville March, compared to the same months of last year show steadily increasing sales of legal whisky in Jones County's four stores.

February of this year showed a big gain over February 60; \$25,-497.05 over \$19,849.10 - an increase of \$5,647.95.

The March increase is in about the same ratio: \$27,358.70 over \$21,284 - an increase of \$6,074.70.

The system's fourth store did not open until March 23, 1960.

Sales by stores with last years sales in parentheses were as follows: February, Store No. 1 in Trenton \$4,824.40 (\$5,754.50), Store No. 2 at Hargett Crossroads \$9,-495.40 (\$8,498.35), Store No. 3 at Wyse Fork \$4,575.65 (\$5,596.25) and Store No. 4 on U. S. 17 between Maysville and Pollocksville \$6,601.60 (Not open last February).

For March Store No. 1 \$5,206.10 (\$5,728.), Store No. 2 \$9,288.90 (\$8,-340.40), Store No. 3 \$5,250.95 (\$5.-901), Store No. 4 \$7,612.75 (\$1,314.-60 opened on March 23, 1960.).

The first nine months of the current fiscal period - from July 1, 1960 through March 31, 1961 showed a net profit to the system of \$30,55.10.
