

Head-on Crash Claims Two Lives Monday Near Pink Hill

Lenoir County's 5th and 6th highway deaths of 1961 came at 7 Monday night in a head-on crash on a rural ayed road about 3 miles north of Pink Hill.

Two drivers, riding alone were instantly killed in a crash about a half mile east of NC 11 on the Jonestown Road. They were Mrs. Josephine Kornegay Tyndall, 48, and Lester Lee Britt Jr., 26.

Mrs. Tyndall, a resident of the neighborhood where the tragedy took lace, was headed east and got on the wrong side of the road in a curve in front of the George Miller home. She worked in the Pink Hill School cafeteria.

Britt, of Albertson route 1, was driving westwardly. He was a navy veteran and an employee of the Du Pont Company; married and the father of two children.

The impact of the two cars threw both drivers into the steering wheels of their cars with terrific impact, killing them instantly in the opin-

There were no witness, nor survivors so the only evidence was the

position in which the cars were found, and on that basis Mrs. Tyndall was classified as the driver at fault.

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John Larkins Nominated For Federal Judgeship

Trenton Attorney John D. Larkins Jr. was one of three prominent North Carolina attorneys recommended Monday for appointment to newly created federal district judgeships.

Senators Sam Ervin and Everett Jordan recommended Larkins for the additional judge in the Eastern District, Malcolm Seawell for the additional judge in the Middle District and Braxton Craven Jr. for the additional Western District judge.

The recommendations are almost certain to be approved in the senate. The appointments are for life and carry a salary of \$22,500 per year, travel and office expense allocations. Algernon Bulter, Edwin Stanley and Wilson Warlick are the judges already serving, who will be helped by the additional Judges.

Conservation News

Go check the color of water in your fish pond. Is it dark bluish-green, only cloudy blue, or clear?

Fertilizing a fish pond to make fish grow might sound odd, but reports are that it works. When a pond has a desirable balance between the bass and bluegills and is properly fertilized, between 100 to 300 pounds of fish per acre can be produced annually. The average annual catch on such a pond runs between 150 and 170 pounds per acre.

Here's how it works. By spreading a chemical fertilizer, say 8-8-2 or 20-20-5, over the pond, the microorganisms in the water directly utilizes the elements in the fertilizer. These microorganisms give the water its greenish color.

This provides food for insects such as stoneflies, Mayflies and

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
