George Nick Noble has been elected by the voters of Jones County as a supervisor of the Lower Neuse Soil and Water Conservation District. Noble is to occupy the supervisor position for a three year term to begin January 1, 1962, according to Charlie Davis, Chairman of the Lower Neuse District.

Noble, along with the other supervisors. Chairman Davis and Joseph Turner, will plan and direct the soil and water conservation program and activities in Iones County and the Lower Neuse District.

A farm owner and operator, Noble is active in many local organizations. He has served as a member of the local District board since 1959, and will complete his first term of office December 31, 1961. The Lower Neuse Soil and Water Conservation District, a legal subdivision of the N. C. State government, includes Jones, Craven, Pamlico, Onslow, and Carteret Counties.
