Judge Walter Bone of Nashville, ho presided over a civil term of Jones County Superior Court this week, on Tuesday non-suited an action bronght by Mrs. Ridie Ward Hargett to collect \$14,000 from three Hargett to collect \$14,000 from three insurance companies. Mrs. Hargett alleged that the Fidelity Mutual, Phoenix Mutual and Jefferson Standard Insurance Companies held polices on her late husband, Guy Hargett, totalling \$14,500 and in which there were confidential indensity clauses that colled double indemnity clauses that called for payment of twice the face value of the policies in the event of accidental death.

The suit alleged that Hargett died from insect stings, tather than from a heart attack, which was the rea-son given for his death by the certifying physician.

After hearing all of the plaintiff's evidence in support of the accidental death claim, Judge Bone granted the motion for non-suit made by defending lawyers.



Authorities say the youth has a previous record of mental derangement and was recently released from the state hospital at Goldsboro.


Man Bound Over for August '60 Shooting

George Henry Sparrow of 118 South Adkin Street was bound over to the June term of Lenoir County Superior Court last week on probable cause of assault with a deadly weapon.

The charge was placed against Sparrow on August 20, 1960 after Sparrow's next door neighbor, Johnny Hobson of 116 South Adkin Street, had suffered a serious shotgun wound in the leg.

Hobson has never fully recovered from the wound, and civil litigation has been filed against Sparrow for the injury.

Sparrow is accused of crawling beneath his house and shooting Hobson from ambush, when Hobson spoke to Mrs. Sparrow.
