Timber Squabble Ends In Consent Judgment

A long-standing squabble between Timber Merchant Finley McMillan of Pender County and several Jones County landowners was settled at the November term of Jones County in a consent judgment.

McMillan had sued Mr. and Mrs. James D. West, Mr. and Mrs. E. O. West, Mr. and Mrs. P. J. West Jr. and Mrs. P. J. West for damages they had caused him to suffer by refusing his agents access to a tract

of timber he had purchased. Under the consent order the Wests are to pay McMillan \$3,000, McMillan is to be returned a \$300 deposit he made with the court and the defendants are to pay all court costs.

The order further stipulates that the West's may settle for \$2500 payment to McMillan if they complete payment on or before the end the \$2500.
