**Notice of Special Election
TOWN OF MAYSVILLE,
NORTH CAROLINA**

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a special election will be held in the Town of Maysville, North Carolina, on the 18th day of January, 1964, for the purpose of submitting the question whether the qualified voters of said Town shall approve the indebtedness to be incurred by the issuance of bonds of said Town of the maximum principal amount of \$214,000 to finance the construction of a water system maintained by the Town to provide a supply of water to said Town and its inhabitants including an elevated water storage tank, water treatment facilities, wells and water mains and distribution lines, together with the acquisition and installation of the equipment, machinery and apparatus required therefore and the acquisition of the necessary land or rights-in-land, and a tax to be levied for the payment thereof, and also the bond ordinance adopted by the Board of Commissioners of said Town on December 3, 1963, which authorizes the issuance of said bonds for such purpose and the levy of such tax.

The ballots to be used at said election shall contain the words "For the ordinance authorizing \$214,000 of bonds to finance the construction of a water supply system to be maintained by the Town to provide a supply of water to said Town and its inhabitants, including an elevated water storage tank, water treatment facilities, wells and water mains and distribution lines, together with the acquisition and installation of the equipment, machinery and apparatus required therefore and the acquisition of the necessary land or rights-in-land, and a tax therefor" and the words "Against the ordinance authorizing \$214,000 of bonds to finance the construction of a water supply system to be maintained by the Town to provide a supply of water to said Town and its inhabitants, including an elevated water storage tank, water treatment facilities, wells and water mains and distribution lines, together with the acquisition and installation of the equipment, machinery and apparatus required therefore and the acquisition of the necessary land or rights-in-land, and a tax therefor" with squares in front of each proposition in one of which squares the voter may make an mark to indicate his choice.

In the event that the qualified voters approve the indebtedness to be incurred by the issuance of said bonds and the tax therefor and said ordinance, the bonds authorized by such ordinance will be issued for the purpose stated and any annual tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds will be levied.

The polls for said election will open at the hour of 6:30 o'clock A. M., and will close at the hour of 6:30 o'clock, P. M., (Eastern Standard Time).

The polling place for said election, shall be the usual polling place in the Town of Maysville, namely: Maysville Town Hall.

The Board of Commissioners has appointed Harold Mattocks to act as Registrar and Maxine Britt and J. T. Creech to act as Judges of Election for said election.

The Registrar will be furnished with the registration book used at the last regular election held in the Town of Maysville (being the regular municipal election held on May 7, 1963) and he will revise the registration book so that it will show an accurate list of the electors previously registered in the Town and still residing therein, without requiring such electors to register anew. The Registrar will keep the registration book open for the reg-

istration of new electors on each day (Sundays and holidays excepted) for the period beginning Friday, the 27 day of December, 1963, and ending on Saturday, the 4th day of January, 1964. The books will be kept open on each Saturday during such period from 9:00 o'clock, A. M., Eastern Standard Time and on other days during such period from 9:00 o'clock, A. M., until 5:00 o'clock, P. M., Eastern Standard Time. The registration book will be kept open at the polling place hereinbefore named on Saturday, the 4th day of January, 1964, for the inspection of electors and any of such electors shall be allowed to object to the name of any person appearing on said book.

C. W. Lancaster introduced the following bond ordinance which was read at length to the Board:

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$214,000 OF BONDS OF THE TOWN OF MAYSVILLE FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF A WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM FOR THE TOWN.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Maysville, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Commissioners of the Town of Maysville has ascertained and hereby determines that it is necessary that said Town shall construct a water system to be maintained by the Town to provide a supply of water to said Town and its inhabitants including an elevated water storage tank, water treatment facilities, wells and water mains and distribution lines, together with the acquisition and installation of the equipment, machinery and apparatus required therefore and the acquisition of the necessary land or rights-in-land.

Section 2. Said Board of Commissioners has also ascertained and hereby determines that the purpose hereinbefore described is a necessary expense of said Town within the meaning of Section 6 of Article VII of the Constitution of North Carolina, and is a purpose for which said Town may raise or appropriate money, and is not a current expense of said Town.

Section 3. In order to provide funds for such purpose, in addition to any funds which may be made available for such purpose from any other source, bonds of the Town of Maysville are hereby authorized and shall be issued pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act, 1921, of North Carolina. The maximum aggregate amount of bonds authorized by this ordinance shall be Two Hundred Fourteen Thousand Dollars (\$214,000).

Section 4. A tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

Section 5. A statement of the debt of said Town has been filed with the Town Clerk of said Town, as required by said Act, and is open to public inspection.

Section 6. This ordinance shall take effect when approved by the voters of said Town at an election to be called and held as provided in said Act.

The foregoing bond ordinance was passed on the 3rd day of December, 1963, and was first published on the 12th day of December, 1963.

Any action or proceedings questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty



Shade and-flowering trees have many uses in the landscape. They are essential for a beautiful setting and for gracious living. They not only provide shade and color but can be used for framing the house, background, screening and for wind-breaks.

Now is a good time to check your landscape and plant trees that will blend, harmoniously, with the surroundings.

Right now I am having my annual battle with leaves. However, this is only temporary because I am dutifully raking them up and carrying them to the compost pile where they will work for me later on. If they are left in the street they clog the drains when floated in by heavy rains. If too many are shredded with a rotary mower on the grass, you may have trouble.

Perhaps a list of some of the more desirable trees will be helpful to you in making selections. First the small flowering trees: dogwood, sourwood, crapemyrtle, flowering crabapples (there are many kinds to select from), serviceberry, Japanese cherries, sweet bay, goldenchain tree, mimosa (only wilt resistant sorts), white fringe tree, American mountain ash, saucer magnolia, American holly, flowering plum.

Of the shade trees there are the oaks: live, laurel, Darlington, white, northern red, scarlet, willow, shingle, chestnut, swamp chestnut and southern red; the Maples: Norway, sycamore, red, sugar and southern sugar maple.

Others include red and green ash, Kentucky coffee tree, American beech, southern magnolia, linden (basswood), white ash, pecan, hickory, pine, hackberry, river birch and yellow birch.

Some undesirable shade trees are osage orange, mulberry, honey locust, American elm (Dutch elm disease), chinaberry, silver maple (sub-

ject to storm damage; brittle), black walnut, southern catalpa, persimmon, blackjack, turkey and pin oaks.

It will be recognized that some of these undesirable sorts are so classified because the fruits they drop become a nuisance: mulberry, honey locust and osage orange.

Some unusual trees you may wish to plant: upright Norway maple, yellowwood, weeping birch, upright ginkgo (specify male trees because female trees produce ill-smelling fruit), Asiatic magnolia, black gum, cork tree, Tilford red maple, English oak, Armstrong red maple, Seanon red maple, flowering ash, goldenrain tree, fruitless mulberry, littleleaf linden, whitebeam mountain ash and European mountain ash.

Your local nurseryman can help you with the lists supplied. If he cannot, let me know and I will try to put you in touch with a source of supply.
