

County Election Board Chairman John C. B. Koonce reported Thursday morning a total of 21 county candidates for the assorted offices open and subject to the May 30th primary election.

Principal among the races that has developed is an 11-way tangle for the five seats on the county board of commissioners.

In the commissioner race there were only three incumbents who had paid their filing fee as of 10 a.m. Thursday. They are Chairman Nelson Banks, Horace Lee Haddock and Harold Mallard.
