## GARDEN TIME

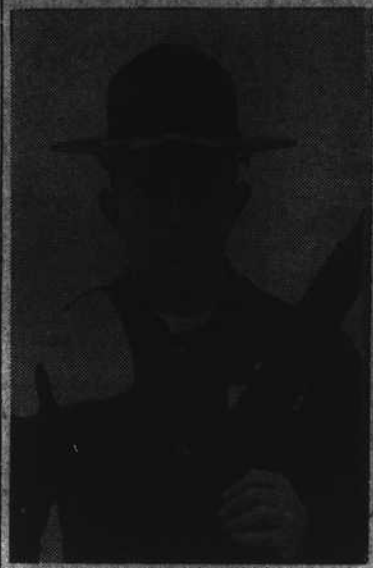

The soldier-shooters, representing 13 major Commands of the Army in Europe, will be competing for rifle, pistol and automatic rifle championships.

The 29-year-old soldier, son of William C. Howard, 418 E. Vernon Ave. in Kinston, is a surveyor in V Corps, Army Marksmanship Unit in Germany.

He entered the Army in June 1958 and arrived overseas on this tour of duty in November 1962. Howard attended Grainger High School. His mother, Mrs. Margret D. Jones, lives at 1207 W. Agarita, San Antonio, Tex.
