In both counties Democratic Gubernatorial Nominee Dan Moore led the Democratic nom-inee for president.

In Lenoir the presidential vote was 7599 for Johnson to 5590 for Goldwater.

In Jones County the presidential vote was 2079 for Johnson to 759 for Goldwater.

In the governor race in Jones County Moore beat Gavin 2268 to 567 and in Lenoir County Moore swamped Gavin by 9384 to 3778.

Both Jones and Lenoir county gave lopsided margins for the state school bond issue of \$100,-000,000.

The allocation of the state bond issue to Jones County is \$280,512.72. The Kinston City School System will get \$551,2823.31 and the Lenoir County System will get \$759,845.94.

In Lenoir County where approval for a five-cent tax levy and \$150,000 appropriation was on the ballot to provide expansion funds for a community col-lege this gained the same easy kind of victory.

In Jones County there was no county office contested by Republicans but in the race for rd district congressman Incumbent David Henderson slaughtered his Republican op-ponent Sherman Rock of Morehead City.

Lenoir County had Republican competition for the board of county commissioners and for the county's seat in the general assembly. To say that the Republican opposition was of a token nature is to put it mildly.

Former Kinston Mayor Guy Elliott, the Democratic legislative nominee, clobbered Republican Nominee Noyles Sewell and the five Democratic nominess for the board of county commissioners zoomed by the two Republicans, John Cameron and A. M. Sparrow, without having to use their passing
