Mrs. Melvin Harris and children from Virginia have been visiting her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Heath.

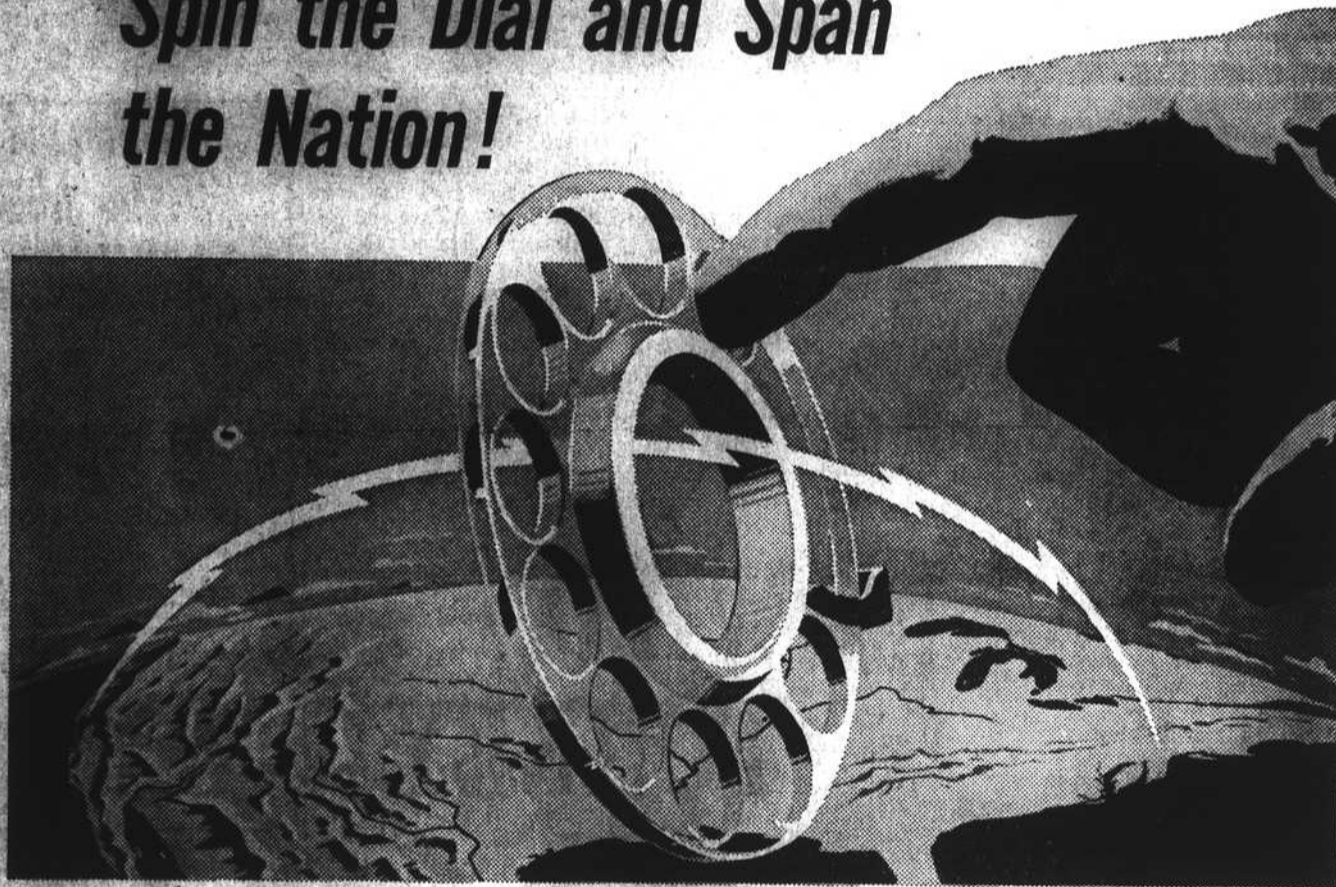
