

**How can I desalt the pot of over-salted soup?** Wash slice a raw white potato into the soup and boil for a short time. Then remove the potato, which will have absorbed most of the salt.

**What happens when soda is used in cooking green vegetables? (Does anyone ever do this?) Never-oh-never! — use soda in cooking green vegetables. Why? — It increases loss of vitamins — and even if the vegetables look pretty, it won't mean much with important food value gone.**

**Is there some way to store lettuce in the refrigerator so that the leaves won't rust? Try wrapping the lettuce in a paper towel first.**

**How can I make mashed potatoes look real fluffy?**

**What method is used to get the maximum amount of juice from lemons?** You can usually get more juice out of lemons by quickly heating them in hot water for several minutes before squeezing or rolling to soften. This can apply to oranges and grapefruit too. This does not injure the vitamin content yet gives you almost again as much juice.

I am afraid that too few of us fully appreciate the varied topography of North Carolina and the wealth of flora and fauna to be found within her borders.

Have you tried Chinese chestnut trees? This is a good dual-purpose tree as it yields very desirable nuts and can also be used in the landscape plan. If used in the landscape plan, it should not be used as a specimen plant or as a point of interest. Rather, it would be best to plant it in the backyard or along the border of a large front yard.

Trees of the Chinese chestnut are in good supply. Contact your local nurseryman. If he does not stock trees, he can get them for you. If you wish, write me and I will put you in touch with a source of plants.

Perhaps you would like to have a few apple trees but have found it difficult to care for the large standard sorts. If this is the case, you may wish to try the dwarf types.

The advantages of dwarf trees are early bearing and space conservation. There are several degrees of dwarfing but I would suggest that you use the East Malling No. IX rootstock be-

cause it is the most bearing of the stocks available from the nursery. If things go well, these trees usually start bearing in the second or third year after planting.

The root system is a little slow in becoming established in the soil so some form of support is necessary for the first two years to prevent the wind from tipping the trees which would interfere with root development. Tying the trees to a couple of rigid stakes will be all that is necessary. Use some soft material to secure the stem to the stakes in order not to restrict growth or injure the bark — a strip of inner tube or strips of cloth.

These variety combinations will assure pollination of flowers.

**Q — My \$5,000 U. S. Government Life Insurance is now paid up. However, my wife has just died. I have over a thousand dollars in bills, and twice as much insurance as I need. Can I change my insurance to meet this situation?**

**A — Yes. You may borrow against your insurance, or you may cash in part of it, retaining the amount of protection you consider necessary. Your beneficiary designation probably should be revised too.**

**Q — What assistance can the VA give me in locating my husband who is receiving compensation?**

**A — The VA may forward mail to veterans. However, the VA is obligated to keep information concerning a veteran confidential and an address may not be revealed without the veteran's consent. Letters sent to the VA to be forwarded should be placed in an unsealed envelope and mailed to the VA Regional Office last known to have handled the veteran's claim.**
