Some persons may not believe that a Communist could reach a position of responsibility in Government through the election process. They have only to consider the thousands of votes cast for William Cottle Taylor, vice chairman of the party's southern California district, who publicly identified himself as a Communist while running in the California primary as an independent candidate for the Board of Supervisors of Los Angeles County. Although Taylor was defeated, he rolled up an impressive 33,576 votes, some 13 per cent of the total vote cast for this office on June 2, 1964.
