## Gas Thieves Caught Both Are Indicted In Act, One Shot

interim report: First, that Kinston should not drill another well within two miles of any existing well, and that drilling should be best done southeast and southwest of Kinston to avoid being nearer to the Du Pont plant's thirst.

And secondly, the report says that further studies should be made to determine how widespread the effects of the Kinston and Du Pont wells is, and finally that immediate test borings should be undertaken to determine if there is a fifth "aquifer" beneath Kinston capable of supplying large quantities of high quality water.

An aquifer is a rock strata which permits the free movement of ground water in usable quantities.

At present Kinston and Du Pont are obtaining the majority of their water from the third and fourth aquifers which underlay this area.

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A pair of unusual indictments has been placed against a pair of western Lenoir County brothers after the death Friday night of a 19 year-old Walter Dawson of Kinston route 2.

Officers from the sheriff's department who investigated say a fight started at the home of Winnie Lee Dawson on Kinston route 2 after an argument began over a crap game.

In the fight McKinley Fleming 19, allegedly struck Dawson with a pop bottle and inflicted rather serious injuries, but not enough to stop the fight completely.

While the two teen-agers were still fighting, the 26 year-old brother of Fleming, Willie Lee, arrived on the scene and intervened with a .22 caliber pistol, which is alleged to be the murder weapon. Dawson died from a single wound in the chest.

The older Fleming has been charged with murder and bound over to superior court under \$1500 bond, while the younger Fleming was charged with assault with a deadly weapon with intent to kill and has been bound over under \$500 bond.

## Interim Report on Kinston Water Resources Indicates Kinston's 'Unlimited' Water Supply is Not Unlimited

Some years ago, after being hit on the head by a small jug of water, the then Chamber of Commerce secretary for Kins-

ton, delivered himself of some poorly scanning doggerel, which was inscribed upon drinking glasses to extol Kinston's mag-

nificent and "unlimited" water supply.

Last winter when New Bern's thirst reached a dozen miles westwardly to tap this same "unlimited" water supply, Kinstonians with a curiosity about such things agreed that an intelligent, if not poetic look should be taken on just how "unlimited" the city's water supply really is.

The first of two reports on the subject from the North Carolina Department of Water Resources is now in the hands of city officials and it points up what most had suspected: That chamber of commerce doggerel is one thing and "unlimited" water supplies are quite another.

The highly technical and voluminous "interim report" indicates in very clear language that Kinston's seven wells and the six at Du Pont's plant are appreciably lowering something called the "Piezometric Surface" in their specific areas. To the average non - expert this high-blown phrase means water table.

And as one result of this finding two things come from the civic groups. Construction on the site is planned to begin in the Fall of 1966.

## Air-Conditioned Mall Announced for Kinston; D. C. Firm Owns Corporation

Lenoir County's first regional shopping center and Eastern North Carolina's first fully air-conditioned, enclosed Mall will be developed at Kinston. Carolina Plaza Development Corporation has acquired a 33-acre site on Route 70, near 258, just west of Kinston.

The leasing agent for Kinston Mall will be Kenneth E. Diehl, of the Shannon & Luchs Company in Washington, D. C. Diehl a Shannon & Luchs shopping center specialist, is consultant to the Carolina Plaza Development Corporation, developers of the 200,000 square - foot Kinston Shopping Center.

Preliminary plans are now being completed by Billy Griffin of Goldsboro, architect for the \$3 million dollar Kinston center. Upon entering the enclosed mall, shoppers will be able to browse from store to store in complete air - conditioned comfort — walking among fountains and unusual tropical plant-

ings. Free parking will be provided for 2500 automobiles.

Carolina Plaza Development Corporation is headed by two Washingtonians, Elaine Kerr, now a practicing attorney at Bailey's Crossroads, Virginia, and Angelo Verdicano, who is married to the former Iris Hood. Mrs. Verdicano's mother, Mrs. Maude Hood, is a life - long resident of the Kinston area and resides at the family home at Wyse Forks. Elaine Keer is the former Elaine Worley of Goldsboro. Verdicano is associated with the third officer of the Corporation, Fred Stone, in the Approved Maintenance Service Corporation of Washington, D. C.

Shannon & Luchs Company of Washington has opened negotiations for prospective tenants for the Center according to Diehl. Plans call for a second floor of offices and studies as well as a community meeting to accommodate banquets and
