And secondly, the report says that further studies should be made to determine how widespread the effects of the Kinston and Du Pont wells is, and finally that immediate test borings should be undertaken to determine if their is a fifth 'aquifier" beneath Kinston capable of supplying large quantities of high quality water.

An aquifier is a rock strata which permits the free movement of ground water in usable quantities.
