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## Last Miserable Chapter Written

A tiny item, noting the transfer of a lot in Pollocksville Township, is probably the final chapter in a miserable story of legal rebbery that has taken the home of an ignorant but hardworking Pollocksville couple.

Some years ago a swindler, selling aluminum siding, ap-oached Johnny and Mary Belle Brown and sold them a siding "job" and other minor improvements to their small Pollocksville home. Theye were told that the job would cost not less than \$1800 nor more than \$2500.

Neither of the pair could read or write with any ease, and neither could very legibly write their names. But they did sign a paper that was stuck before them by this "merchant."

When that instrument was recorded in the office of Jones County Register of Deeds Bill Parker it had grown to a mortgage of more than \$10,000 on the small home of this ignorant couple.

The mortgage was sold by the peddling company to a pur-ortedly reputable mortgage investment company in Winston-Salem. It foreclosed on this couple and now their home has been sold by the mortgage company to another person.

## Large-Scale Hail Insurance Fraud is Reported in East Carolina by Lanier

At a Tuesday press conference | names of farmers who knew no-North Carolina Insurance Commissioner Edwin Lanier told of large-scale fraud in hail insurance claims in Eastern North Carolina during the past three crop years; and even more in the current year.

Lanier said a full-field investigation so far nas turned up \$139,884.20 in fraudulent claims paid by insurance companies. No specific offenders were named by Lanier Tuesday, but apparently names would be called and indictments made at a later date, since he pointed out that this was "an interim report."

The fraud involves insurance agencies, adjusters and farmers, although in several instances claims were paid, Lanier said, in the names of farmers who had no knowledge that claims had been filed.

Lanier said claims totalling \$101,463 were paid on farms upon which no tobacco was grown, on 12 claims \$34,347 was paid in which fictitious names were used and in three instances, \$4,072 was paid out in the plans call for development of a

# Final Word on Journal-Brock Affair

The editor of the Journal (Jack Rider, in case anybody doesn't know) adds this final — he hopes — footnote to the semantical dispute that was caused by a Journal news item of June 23rd between Jones County Attorney Donald Brock and himself.

The item - which was written by Rider, without outside help, inspiration or agitation, said in part, in speaking of issues in the June 25th second primary election: "One (issue) is County Attorney Donald Brock, who succeed some years on in getting a slate of commissioners elected who fired the Late George Hughes as county attorney and gave the job to Brock."

Brock Tuesday said that the only part of the item that offended him was the inference that he had actively worked to get Hughes fired. He said he took no active part in the election of any of the commissioners who voted to fire Hughes, and when the commissioners approached him about taking the job he advised them not to fire Hughes. But when they persisted and said they were going to fire Hughes anyway; he agreed to take the

Brock did say Tuesday that in subsequent electrons he had taken an interest in commissioner elections but in the 1960 election he took no part on behalf of any candidate other than to vote for the five he felt best qualified to serve

Perhaps the phrase "who succeeded in getting a slate elected" does carry the connotation of Brock's active participation, and since Brock categorically denies that he did take an active part, the Journal expresses its regrets for having been guilty of creating an impression which Brock says does not exist.
