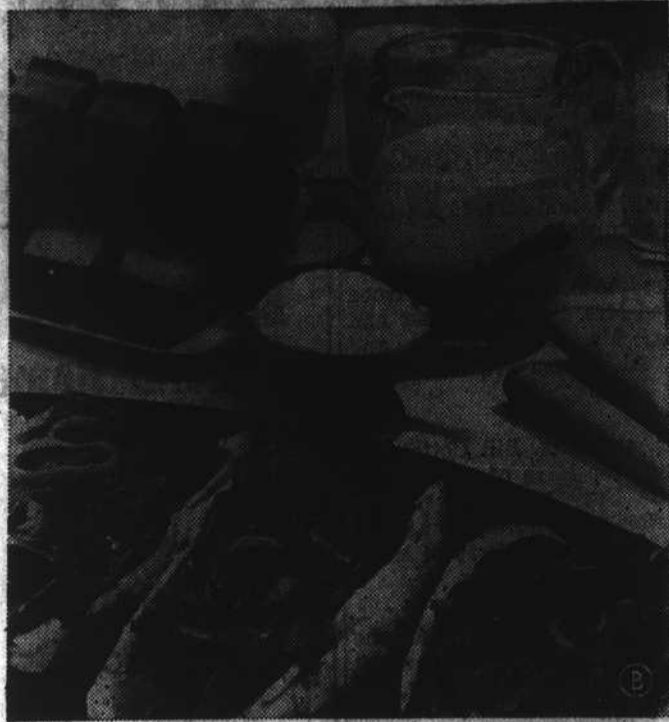


### SPICY TOMATO-BEEF SANDWICHES

In skillet, brown mushrooms and cook green pepper, onion, garlic, and oregano in butter until vegetables are tender. Add soup, water, and beef. Heat, stirring now and then. Serve on rolls; garnish with cheese. Makes 4 servings.

July is usually hot and dry in most sections of the state but there are many garden jobs to be accomplished, especially looking after the water requirements of all plants and turf grasses. If you planted evergreens last spring, they will suffer unless you apply water.

Remove faded flowers from snapdragons, phlox, delphinium and crepe myrtle. This prevents seed formation, an exhausting plant process; and will make them bloom longer.

If you have, earlier in the season, looked after the fertilizer requirements of your lawn, it is best not to apply fertilizer at this time because it may encourage weeds more than grass. Water regularly during prolonged dry periods.

Keep chrysanthemums growing for your fall color show by feeding them every two or three weeks. Provide needed support and protect from insect and disease pests by following a planned spray program. The loss of leaves on the lower part of the stem and spotted leaves on the upper part of the stem detract from the anticipated color parade.

Lift, divide and replant iris rhizomes. Reduce the leaf area by about one-half before transplanting.

Jonquils, etc., should also be divided and replanted or stored for fall planting. If your bulb crops seem to be "running out", you may wish to place your order now with your dealer for a fresh supply to be planted later.

Give your roses a short rest period by withholding water and fertilizer. This procedure will prolong the blooming period in the fall. Spray regularly for protection against pests.

This is a good time to make cuttings of the woody ornamentals — azaleas, camellias, hydran-

Before the week is over the youngsters will attend classes hear outstanding speakers and elect officers for the coming year. A highlight of the week will be the selection of state winners in over two dozen 4-H demonstrations and projects.

geas and hollies. Make the cuttings about four or five inches in length and take them from the terminal growth. Remove about one-third of the lower leaves and make a slanting smooth cut at the base of the stem with a sharp knife. Dip the base of the stem in root producing hormone if you wish.

Place the cuttings in a mixture of equal parts (by volume) of either coarse (concrete) sand and peat moss; or, peat moss and perlite. Place the cuttings on a shaded area and keep them moist at all times. Do not over water.

### Rhubarb Jam Session

RHUBARB is an unusual fruit in that it grows with very little tending, is easy to pick and clean, and is at its prime for several weeks—if not in your back yard, then at your favorite grocer's.

It's delicious in sauces, pies, cobblers, and other desserts, but some folks think that rhubarb must be mixed with strawberries. While the combination is delightful, it seems a shame to limit the use of rhubarb to the short strawberry season and increase the cost of rhubarb treats by the often astronomical price of strawberries.

But now there's a way to have the taste of the rhubarb-strawberry combination without paying so dearly for the treat—just make rhubarb jam using strawberry flavor Jell-O Gelatin to achieve a perfect set. And it's economical, too.

#### Rhubarb-Strawberry Jam

6 cups (about 1 1/2 lb.) diced fresh rhubarb, 3 1/2 cups (1 1/2 lb.) sugar, 1/2 cup water, and 1 package (3 oz.) strawberry flavor gelatin. Thoroughly mix rhubarb, sugar, and water in a large saucepan. Cook and stir over high heat until sugar is dissolved — about 2 minutes. Cover and cook over medium heat, stirring occasionally, until rhubarb is tender. Then remove cover and boil 12 to 15 minutes longer, or until thickened to sauce consistency, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat; stir in gelatin until dissolved. Skim off foam with metal spoon. Ladle quickly into glasses. Cover at once with 1/2 inch hot paraffin. Makes about 6 medium glasses.

Note: This jam is best if used within one month. Jam becomes very thick on longer storage.

### 'SINGLE INSECTICIDE APPLICATION CONTROLS FLIES UP TO 2 MONTHS

Few livestock producers realize the importance of controlling flies on their premises. In addition to spreading many diseases, these annoying pests can seriously hamper efficient weight gains and milk production.

Now, many livestockmen throughout the country report exceptional long-lasting control of flies with a unique new insecticide, known as Cygon.

Beginning the day after application, Cygon eliminates these pests continuously for up to 8 weeks or longer. Thus, as little as two applications can provide protection against these insects for an entire season.
