½ cup gingersnap crumbs (10-12 snaps) 2 cups canned apple sauce 1 teaspoon instant minced

garlic 2 cup cider vinegar 1 tablespoon Worcestershire

1-2 teaspoons chili powder (to taste) 1½ teaspoons salt ¼ cup salad oil 1 cup water Several dashes Tabasco,

to taste

Combine all ingredients mixing well; cook and stir over moderate heat 10 to 12 minutes. Makes about 3½ cups sauce,

Special Ham-Bologna . . This is an inexpensive meat. Buy a large bolonga 4 pounds or more—and remove any casing; score as you would a ham, inserting cloves if desired. Place over hot coals and spit-roast over medium heat for about 10 minutes, then brush with sauce. Continue roasting, and basting with sauce, for about 25 minutes until meat is heated through and is crisp and brown on the surface. Slice and serve on buttered bread slices or buns. Thin any remaining sauce with a little water or broth. Heat and serve with meat. Makes 8-10 servings.
