## **Kinston Area Suffers Serious Wrecks** During Holidays but None is Futal Development and Training Act.

Highway Patrolmen and area swerved across the center line police reported one of the quiet-est Christmas holiday periods in memory, but serious accidents put numerous people in local hospitals. The Kinston area did not share in the low holiday death toll across the state.

Last Thursday at the corner of Vernon and Independent vehicles driven by James Earl Barwick of Seven Springs route 1 and Leamon Dawson Barrow of Kinston route 2 collided, in-juring Tammy Barwick, 8, and Mac Forman of Kinston, who was riding with Barrow. Barwick was charged with failing to yield the right of way and damage to the two vehicles was estimated at \$400 and a third driven by Betty Howard of 906 Candlewood Drive had \$100 damage when it was hit.
