

# 1968 Tobacco Disease Control Begins Now

It may seem premature to be thinking about the 1968 tobacco crop at this date, but it's the ideal time to begin planning how to avoid losses to plant diseases next year.

"Growers who have disease symptoms showing up in their fields now can count on having more trouble in the future unless they take some kind of preventive measures," warns Furney Todd, extension plant pathologist at North Carolina State University.

"The first step in a disease control program is to determine what kinds of diseases are present on the farm," he adds. "After the trouble is diagnosed, a grower can begin to take action."

Todd estimates that plant diseases are a 25 million dollar headache for North Carolina tobacco producers. Black shank, Granville wilt, nematodes, brown spot, black root rot, mosaic and others take huge chunks out of grower profits every year.

July and August are the best

times to observe tobacco in the field and to determine what kind of diseases are present.

"County extension agents can usually identify diseases," Todd explained. "If they aren't sure of their diagnosis, they will send samples of infected plants to the Plant Disease Clinic at North Carolina State University for laboratory analysis."

Once the farmer has the information, he can plan a complete control program, one that will take care of the major problems next year and prevent disease build-up.

Such programs usually call for planting disease resistant tobacco varieties, rotating tobacco with other crops, destroying crop residue immediately after harvesting is complete and seeding a winter cover crop.

"This kind of discussion may sound like it's out of season," Todd remarked, "but it is very timely. The tobacco disease problem is a big one in our state and it requires a big effort — including an early start."
