Hospital Site Selection Committee May Pick from 15 Choice Sites

The site selection committee for Lenoir County's new 280-bed hospital is burdened with an elegance of richness: 15 choice sites to choose from.

Meeting on Monday of this week the committee, which includes Chairman Jesse Pugh Wooten, Harry Cummings, W. B. Gladding, Dick Whaley, Ed Langrall and Sol Schechter plotted each of the 15 sites offered on a map and made plans for their next step.

Which is to have the architect and officials of the North Carolina Medical Care Commission look the sites over.

It was also agreed that Kinston Public Works Superintendent Tommy Briley would have prepared a large detailed map, showing not only the locations of each site, but their elevations, existing city sewer and water lines, the flight approaches to Stallings Field and the outlines of the thoroughfare plan approved by the State Highway Commission for the Kinston area.

The 15 sites offered included those of Mrs. Cecil Moore, J. E. Shackelford, Jack Alexander, Rodney Goodman, Leslie Worthington Jr., H. B. Taylor, B. R. "Doc" Rouse, Merle Edwards, Raymond Cunningham, Mrs. E. Y. Speed, John F. Mewborne, Corita Johnson and Mrs. Ruby Bronstein.

Cunningham has offered a choice of three sites. All sites were for 50 or more acres except that of Miss Johnson, who offered a 30-acre site.

The sites extend from Goodman's farm near the Kinstonian

Motel in an arc across the north-west, north and northeast perimeter of Kinston.

Prices for the sites will not be negotiated until after the site selection committee has completed its survey of all sites offered.

City Asks Army's Permission to Span River with Main

The City of Kinston through its consultant engineer has applied to the Wilmington office of the Corps of Army Engineers for permission to either install an underground or an overhead water main across Neuse River about 600 feet downstream from the Queen Street bridge.

The application says bids will be opened in about six weeks from July 17th at which time the city will decide which of the two systems is preferable.

The Corps of Engineers was informed that if buried the main would be at least 3.5 feet below the river bottom and if strung overhead it would have a vertical clearance of 25 feet above normal water level and have 40 feet between the supports which carried it across the river.

Persons who wish to make comments pertinent to the Corps of Engineers on this project should make them in writing on or before 4:45 p.m. August 17th in the Wilmington office.
