First National Bank of Eastern North Carolina Ordered Pay \$40,157

Judge John D. Larkins has signed a judgement which orders First National Bank of Eastern North Carolina to pay \$40,157.55 in back wages due 189 of its employees under the provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act.

The order contains an exhibit which shows that the bank previously paid \$6,051.06 in minimum wages and overtime pay due 57 other employees.

The order futher permanently enjoined and restrained the bank, Mitchell F. Allen, Bruce A. Bryant, and Burnice W. Nash, employees, and all persons acting or claiming to act in their behalf from violating the minimum-wage, overtime-pay, record -keeping and discriminatorydischarge provisions of the FISA The named defendants were also taxed with the costs of the act-

The amount of back minimum wages and overtime pay due the named employees in the order ranges from \$4.24 to \$3,820.88.

The order related to branches of the firm in Wilmington, Jacksonville, Burgaw, Carolina Beach, Elizabethtown, Farmville, Holly Ridge, Mount Olive, Pollocksville, Wallace, Dunn, Eden-

ton and Boone, North Carolina.

Judge Larkins entered the order after the defendents had stipulated the withholding of the back wages due from the named employees, waived all defenses and agreed to entry of the order.

The firm had been previously ordered by the court in October of 1967, to pay \$2,500 fine on each of four counts, for a total of \$10,000, after pleading nolo contendere in a criminal case under the provisions of the
