

Two Lenoir County Republicans Among Five Prominent in Tar Heel GOP Who Announce Support for George Wallace

Larry Moise, chairman of the Republican Party in Lenoir County and Dr. Thornton Hood, a delegate to the Republican convention last month in Miami, joined three other prominent North Carolina Republicans Tuesday in announcing their support of George Wallace for president over GOP Nominee Richard Nixon.

Hood, who gained a fleeting moment of national prominence in the convention, when he was railroaded out by the Republican hierarchy, called Nixon a "political opportunist" who accepted the open housing and total civil rights plank voted in to this year's party platform.

Hood, in Miami, had tried to get before the convention a resolution calling for an end to both trade and aid to communist countries, as well as those coun-

Last week Democratic Incumbent Congressman Walter Jones, who is opposed for re-election by Kinstonian Reece Gardner, said he would honor his pledge to vote for Humphrey in the general election, but Jones added that if the presidential election is thrown in the house, and if he is re-elected he will vote for the presidential candidate who gets the majority vote in the First Congressional District.
