No School Changes This Year—State School Board

North Carolina will run its public schools for the term beginning this fall on the same basis as before.

The State Board of Education made that already apparent fact very clear at a meeting held in Raleigh last Thursday. There can be no turn to non - segregated schools, it said, until the U.S. Supreme Court adds to its historic statement of principle the answers to such vital questions as when and how.

The board's first meeting since the big decision in Washington also brought these developments:

1. A policy of continuing to allot money from the State's \$50,000,000 school building fund provided the projects in question will be permanent and will be usable in either a segregated or unsegregated

2. A halt to the work of devising a formula for allocating half of the \$50,000,000 in school bond money. "Until the situation (the segregation picture) is further clarified it hardly will be possible to for-mulate an allocation policy for that money," Governor Umstead told reporters after meeting with the Board of Education. The second 25 millions of the bond money is to be distributed mainly on a basis of recedent basis of need.
