

The circulation figures for July, 1950 at the Mount Holly Public Library show 8628 books loaned during the year, as compared to 5431 last year (1949), according to an announcement by Mrs. John W. Holland, librarian. This is an increase of 3197 over this time last year, and shows the constant increase of 1960 over this time last year, and shows the constant increase of book circulation in the local library.
