Lincoln County Standing **Behind Commissioner** William A. Graham

(Editorial From Lincoln County News, Lincolnton, N. C., April 20, 1936.)

Among the last minute candidates to file for a state office was W. Kerr Scott, of Alamance, who seeks the nomination for Commissioner of Agriculture against William A. Graham, behind whom the democracy of Lincoln county will stand solidly in the June primary. If there is a public officer in whom the people of this county have a peculiar interest and who has their loyal support it is Commissioner Graham, who was born and reared here and has been active in public affairs since the days of his youth. He has been chairman of the Democratic precinct executive committee at Denver and a member of the County Executive Committee since he was 21 years old, and was for a number of years a member of the State Democratic Executive Committee from this District.

There has never been a fight for democracy in which he did not have served this district in the session of 1923, when he was appointed chairman of the committee on agriculture. While he was chairman of this important committee, his distinguished father, the late Major William A. Graham, passed on, and Governor Morrison appointed him to succeed him as Commissioner of Agriculture. He assumed office in Commissioner Graham will receive January, 1924, and in the primary an overwhelming majority on June of June, that same year, he won the 6. nomination over two opponents.

Under the leadership of Commissioner Graham, the North Carolina State Department of Agriculture has continued to advance, while this distinguished son of Lincoln county, through his wide affiliations, has brought honor to his State. When he had been in office only two years, he was elected vice-president of the National Association of Commissioners of Agriculture, and the next year, 1927, he was elected president of that nationwide organization, succeeding Commissioner Berne A. Pyrke, of New York. He is at present a member of the executive committee of that organization and of the Southern Association of Commissioners of Agriculture.

Commissioner Graham, himself a farmer since his boyhood, has always given his support to and staunchly advocated farmers' organizations. He had been a member of the Grange since that organization's recent re-entry into North Carolina. Many of the things that have come to be sound agricultural practides have long been advocated by the North Carolina Commissioner, including a balanced agricultural program, including diversification, and opposition to overproduction.


