FARM QUESTIONS ANSWERED

Question: I have some chickens about nine weeks old and several appear to have weak legs. What causes this?

Answer: As only a few of the chicks are affected, it would appear that the diet is well balanced because a larger number would show this condition if this were not balanced. Apparently the birds affected are of low constitutional vigor and or more producers incurred this excannot utilize the feed offered. All affected birds should be destroyed, but should also be opened and examined for worms before final disposition. To be sure about the diet, this should be checked at once to see that it is properly balanced.

Question: Will landlords or farm owners share in the soil-conserving payments for land taken out of production of soil depleting crops?

Answer: Yes. This payment will be divided among owners, sharetenants, and share-croppers in the same proportion as the principal soil-depleting crop or the proceeds from this crop is divided under the lease or operating agreement. Soilbuilding payments, however, will be made to the producer who incurred the expense in following out the soil-building practices. If two

Question: How can I control bud worms in my tobaccco?

Answer: The best known control is the poisoned corn meal bait. This is made by mixing six heaping teaspoonsful of arsenate of lead and one peck of corn meal. This amount is sufficient for one acre. A small pinch of this poison bait should be dropped in the center of the bud early in the morning when the bud certain tract of land in Holloway is open. The first application should be made about ten days or two weeks after the plants are set and continued every week or ten days until the plants are topped. Larger amounts of the bait may be made by mixing one pound of arsenate of lead with 50 pounds of corn meal.


