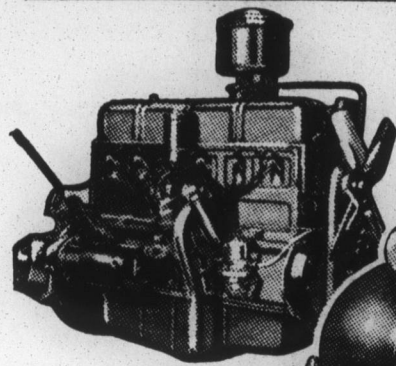
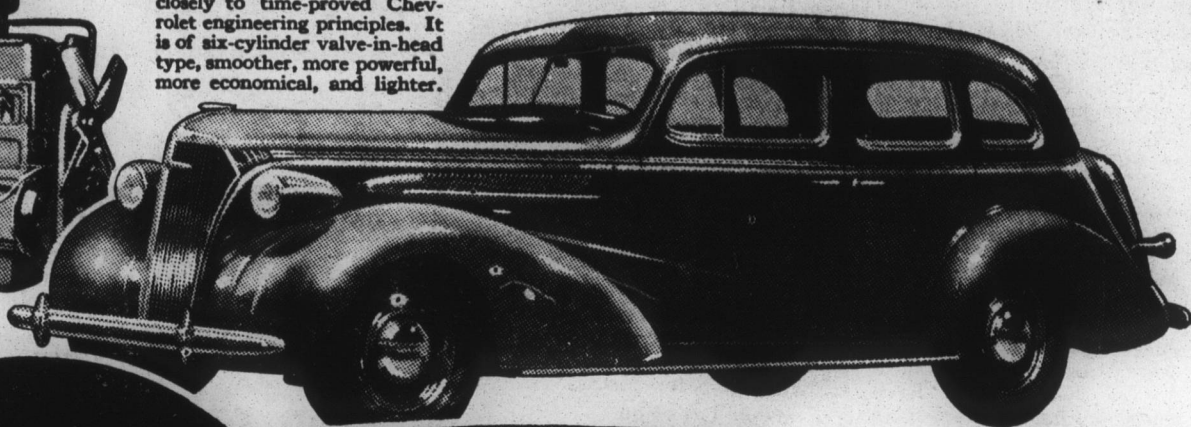


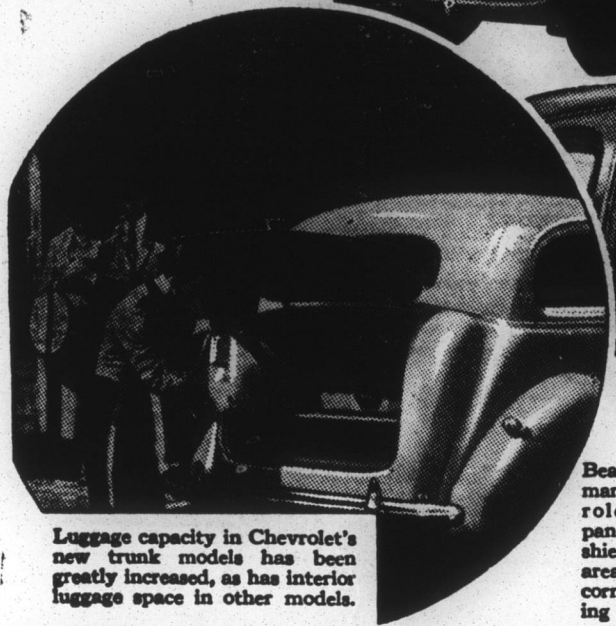
Performance, Beauty and Safety Mark Chevrolet's Completely New Cars

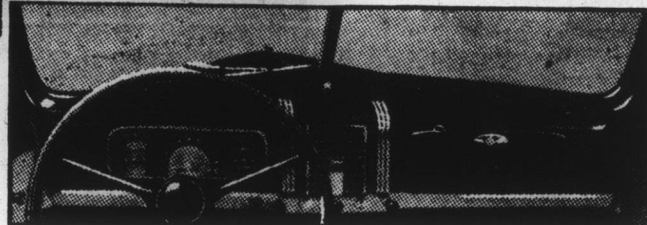

FINAL RITES FOR MISS KATE WRENN

Suffered Stroke of Paralysis Saturday Morning, Oct. 31st and Died Tuesday.

Miss Kate Wrenn, age 65, Route 1, Roxboro, N. C., died at 11:15 a. m. Tuesday, November 3rd, 1936.

Miss Wrenn lived in Warren's Grove School community. Her death occurred at her home near Roxboro, as a result of a paralytic stroke. She suffered the stroke Saturday morning, Oct. 31st, and prior to this time was apparently in her usual state of health until Saturday, when it was realized that she was critically ill, she weakened steadily until the end came peacefully at 11:15 a. m. Tuesday, November 3rd, 1936.

She was a loyal and consistent member of Brookdale M. E. church had been for a great many years. She is survived by only one brother, Mr. S. Y. Wrenn, who is very ill at this time, and by a great many nieces and nephews.

The services were conducted from the home at 3 p. m., Wednesday, November 4th, 1936 by Rev. T. W. Lee, of Brookdale, N. C.

Miss Kate, as she was popularly known, numbered her friends by her acquaintances through the county and surrounding country.

The active pallbearers were her nephews, Alex Wrenn, R. E. Wrenn, Ralph E. Wrenn, S. A. Wrenn, Marvin Wrenn, D. N. Wrenn. The flower bearers were her nieces. The Brookdale choir sang the song selections, "Face to Face," "He Included Me," and "Asleep in Jesus." She was buried in the family cemetery near the home, immediately following services.

JOHNSON DECLARES NEW NRA 'CERTAIN'

Says, However, It Will Come Spontaneously From People, Not Washington.

Arkansas City, Kas., Oct. 29—Gen. Hugh Johnson, former NRA administrator, predicted informally here tonight that a new NRA "is certain to be developed in the next few years," and that it "will come spontaneously from the people, not down from Washington."

Johnson made his NRA prediction in reply to questions after he addressed a Democratic rally. He emphasized that he was not speaking for the administration when he predicted a revival of NRA.

Hits Landon and "Tories" In his formal address, broadcast over a national (NBC red) network, Johnson asserted the "whole issue" of the presidential campaign is "big business vs. popular government" and that "the Tories have taken" Gov. Alf M. Landon.

Three epithets, "Reds, ruin and regimentation," he said, "are the whole Landon campaign."

Questioned about NRA, Johnson replied:

"I've been in 44 states, I know that all labor, a large part of small business and a considerable part of large business feels something of the kind will have to come back

again. "Industry will never absorb unemployment until we do something to shorten hours and increase pay. "It (a new NRA) is certain to be developed in the next few years. It will come spontaneously from the people, not down from Washington."

Assails Envelope Propaganda Discussing the social security act, Johnson asserted that some employers are informing their employes about the social security tax by inserting circulars in pay envelopes.

These employers, he said, are suggesting that their employes vote against President Roosevelt to avoid paying the tax, which becomes effective January 1.

"I've seen some dirty stuff in all parts of the world," Johnson said, "but never anything like that."

"Putting anything of political influence in pay envelopes is coercion. This is contemptible fraud. It is bad enough for an employer to
