

NORMAN PERRY **COMMITS SUICIDE**

Son Of Mrs. Ed Satterfield Shot Himself About 9:00 A. M. Saturday Morning At Mother's Home In Roxboro

RESIDENT OF DURHAM

Norman Perry, 30, resident of Durham, N. C., shot and killed himself about 9 o'clock Saturday morning in the back yard of his mother's home on the Durham road, but in the city limits of Roxboro. Mr. Perry went out to an out-house in the yard and used a 38 revolver. The bullet entered the right temple and came out on the left side of his head. No known reason as to why he committed the act has been given. It is understood that he had a position in Durham and had been in Roxboro for about one week.

Mr. Perry was the son of Mrs. Ed Satterfield of Roxborto. He is so survived by a wife and one ild, both in Durham.

Residents of South Roxboro statthat he had been to a filling staon just a few minutes prior to his ath and that he had taken two ckets of water to his mother's use. They noticed nothing peliar about his actions.

Immediately after the shot was ed Sheriff Clayton and Coroner chols were called. Dr. Nichols, afr an investigation, termed the actn suicide.

Funeral services will be held in urham. Definite arrangements had ot been made late Saturday afteron.
