#### SET 1939 WHEAT GOAL

National wheat goal for 1939 has been set at 55,000,000 acres the minimum provided for in the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938. North Carolina will receive 363,117 acres. The allotment contemplates maintaining adequate supplies in this country for domestic consumption, for the usual exort trade, and for adequate reserves equal to 30 per cent of a normal year's domestic consumption and exports.


