CHAMBERLAIN DEFEATS FACT

London, England—Tumultuous applause greeted Prime Minister Chamberlain when he appeared before the House of Commons to explain in detail the Anglo-

French pact which gave Germany the Sudeten areas of Czechoslovakia and thus forestalled an European war. In explaining his resignation from the Chamberlain cabinet, Alfred Duff-Cooper, First Lord of the Admiralty, expressed doubt as to the duration of the Chamberlain-Hitler peace agreement. "I feel lonely and isolated," he stat-

ed, with the cabinet solidly back of the Prime Minister. The only voice raised against Mr. Chamberlain was that of the lone Communist in Parliament.

BRITAIN REASSURES FRANCE

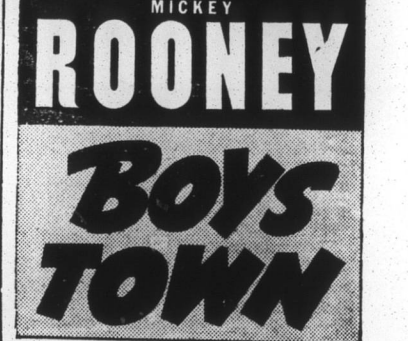
London, England—Assurances have been given Premier Daladier that the pact signed by
