Mrs. Frank Hedrick and children of Siler City were recent visitors with relatives here.

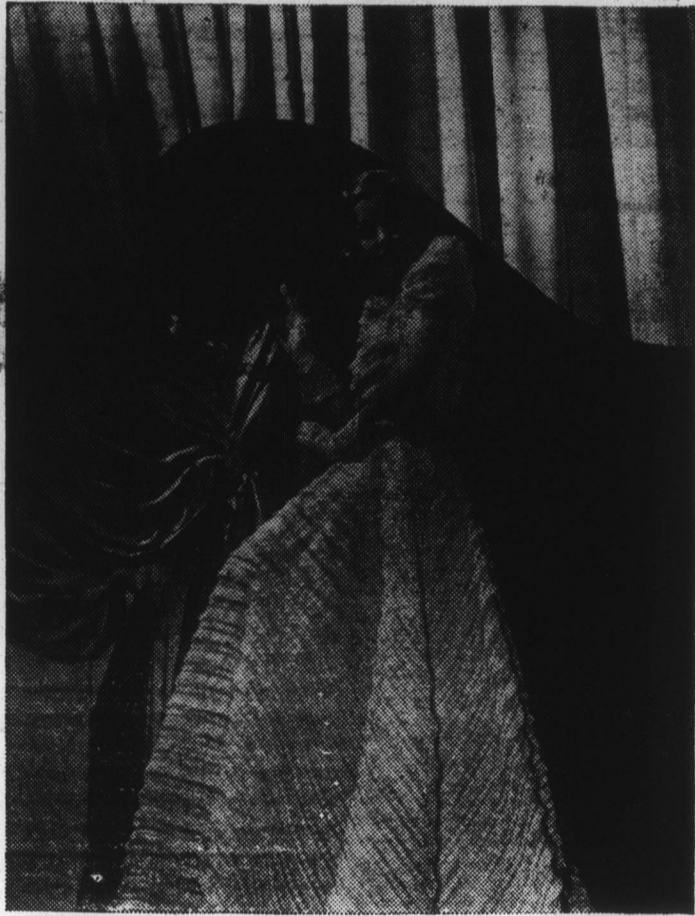
Miss Elnora Raiff left Friday for Valdese. She has accepted a position with the hospital staff there.
